BOARD OF GOVERNORS REPORT

To the Illustrious Commander in Chief, officers and brethren of the Connecticut Council of Deliberation at the Casa Mia at the Hawthorne in Berlin CT on September 27, 2024.

Brothers, good afternoon and greetings from your Board of Governors.

Will the members of the Board of Governors who are present please rise and make their presence known in order to be recognized?

My Brothers, these dedicated volunteers continue to work to support the life changing tutoring provided by the dedicated

team of tutors at the Children's Dyslexia Center of Connecticut. Please join me in offering your appreciation for their time and efforts!

Tutoring services are back in regular operation and are on a steady course to provide teaching services on par with the last academic year. The three centers here in Connecticut have served 40 students for the scholastic year 2023-2024. This past scholastic year we had twelve students tutored in the Bridgeport satellite, eight students in the Hartford satellite and twenty at the main center in Waterbury. Enrollments for the Fall semester are running on par with last year for the most part.

Our statewide staff head count is 11 people, consisting of: 4 people in Bridgeport, Including Co- Director Connie and Tutors Kim, Breda and John, with two scholars namely Samantha and Kelley.

4 people in Farmington, including Co- Director Paula and Tutors, Robin, Elizabeth and Ashley;

8 people in Waterbury, including Director Cheryl, Office Manager Dan, and 5 tutors, namely Joanne, Brianna, Deb, Joan and Claudia along with Scholar Maria.

I will defer in enumerating the progress in matters of certification, of our Scholars in the past year to the Director, Cheryl Sharkis, who I am sure will be covering these matters in greater detail in her report.

I would like to remind the Brothers that additional opportunities for Scholars are to be expected in the next year. Any interested parties should express their interest directly to Director Cheryl Sharkis so that they can contacted as opportunities arise.

Fundraising efforts have closely matched the projected revenue budgets, and expenditures have normalized Post-Covid so as to be consistent with the expected amounts budgeted for this past year. In summary the finances are in order, in no small part due to the ongoing generosity of the

sponsoring Valleys, and the success of their respective fundraising efforts.

I remind everyone here that our next fundraising event is the Annual Dyslexia Walk and which will occur on Sunday October 6 in Waterbury at the usual venue at Noon. This is a key fundraiser for your Centers and I ask that as many of you as possible come out to support this outdoor event. Russ Griswold, continues to manage and market this fundraising activity as he has for the past very many years. His health has improved and recovered and he almost is as spry as he was in 2019!

Your Board of Governors acknowledges the outstanding financial support that comes reliably from the Constituent Valleys in Connecticut. We also acknowledge the outstanding and selfless job that many Brothers in the Constituent Valleys have done to raise and contribute donations for your Centers all year long.

Our traditional fundraising is back in full gear with the Thanksgiving Day Turkey Trot and the Hartford 5K events becoming active and effective fundraising venues for us again. In addition, the Valley of Bridgeport's Annual December Holiday Party and fund raising auction in Branford has continued to be a holiday bright light and has been a great success three years running.

I must acknowledge the continuing and ever creative efforts of Illustrious Brother David Sharkis, 33°, who is finding new havens and involvements for the CDC nationally. I must also, as always, extend kudos to our State Management, Center Director Cheryl Sharkis, and Co-Directors Connie and Paula, as well as all of the Tutors and Tutor Scholars who selflessly deliver the services that will enable our students to overcome their reading difficulties and lay open to them the promise of fully involved academic and career paths with which they can help themselves, and our society. By being effective participants through competent

reading skills, many challenges which would have otherwise stymied their progress in life can be and have been overcome. This yields a better society for all of us as they now are on a position to fully participate and contribute to the Nation. Again, I urge everyone here to please support and participate in our next upcoming fund raiser – specifically the Dyslexia Walk, on Sunday, October 6 2024, which begins at the Waterbury Masonic Temple at noon that day.

REPORT ON SUPREME COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

2024 Executive Session – Lexington, Massachusetts

Membership Report of the Grand Secretary General

June 15, 2023: 83,966 June 15, 2024: 79,294

Net Loss: 4,672

Ritualistic Matters:

Upon the Recommendation of the Committee on Ritualistic Matters the following changes were approved by the Supreme Council:

Adoption of a revised 24th Degree, to be known as "Brother of Tolerance" and listed as such in the Constitutions in Articles 135-1 and 347-2. Note: Ritual Scripts should be available in October 2024 and Degree video in Spring 2025. Adoption of revised Prologues for all Degrees except the 9th, 17th, 20th, 24th, 25th, 31st and 32nd Degrees.

FOR INFORMATIONAL PURPOSES ONLY:

Degree Summaries: The summaries for each Degree have been reviewed and re-written to ensure that they are in conformity with the Prologues of each Degree.

New Degree Videos: The production of the videos of the Allegory of the 32nd Degree and the "new" 24th Degree are priorities of the Committee on Ritualistic Matters.

Retired Degrees: "Retired" Degrees are not to be publicly performed or given credit for the Passport Program. Thursday Night at the Rite: There will be a "Season 6" and it will include an educational component.

Degree Padlocks: Degree Padlocks are not to be returned to Supreme Council. They may be retained by the Valley and used as a safe way to collect and store current Degree videos from Journey 365.

Playbills:

Supreme Council is preparing a Playbill for each Degree, to include a cast list, Degree summary, statement of historical and/or biblical context, and a series of "reflection questions", which can be used as a "debrief" for each Degree.

3. Legislative Changes to Constitutions of the Supreme Council:

Article 134-1 of the Constitutions was amended to add a Committee on Audit as a Standing Committee as Article 134-1(16)

Articles 135-1.24 and 347.4.24 of the Constitutions were amended to change the title of the 24th Degree from "The

Brother of Tolerance" to the "Brother of the Forest", to accommodate the adoption of the revised 24th Degree. Article 702-1 of the Constitutions was amended was amended to raise the annual assessment on Lodges of Perfection from \$30.00 to \$35.00 per member, effective June 16, 2026.

Article 111 of the Constitutions was amended to, inter alia, provide for each state to earn a nomination of an Honorary Member for each thirty-three (33) candidates initiated into the Fourth Degree and to allocate to each state one At Large Honorary Member to be nominated from each state per annum.

4. Nominees to receive the 33rd Degree: This year, six (6) Brothers from Connecticut were nominated and elected to receive the 33rd Degree in Indianapolis, Indiana in August of 2025. The Brothers are as follows:

Brother Eric P. Meyer, 32°, MSA, Valley of Bridgeport; Brother Frank Dlugoleski, 32°, MSA, Valley of Hartford; Brother Steven M. Allinson, 32°, MSA, Valley of New Haven; Brother Jason A, Fletcher, 32°, MSA, Valley of Norwich, Brother Frank J. Saviano, 32°, MSA, Valley of Norwich; and Brother Harold A. Elwell, 32°, MSA, Valley of Waterbury.

These distinguished Brothers will join Brothers Robert F. Polito, Jr. 32°, Valley of Bridgeport; Gary D. Shepard, 32°, MSA, Valley of Bridgeport; Scott B. Bumps, 32°, MSA, Valley of New Haven; and John E. Stogden, 32°, MSA, Valley of Norwich, who were elected to receive the 33° at our Annual Session in Louisville, Kentucky in August 2023.

REPORT OF THE AUDIT COMMITTEE

To the Illustrious Commander-in-Chief, Officers and Brethren of the Connecticut Council of Deliberation in Session at Berlin, Connecticut on September 27, 2024:

The committee was established following the Connecticut Council of Deliberation session on September 15, 2018.

The committee has been charged with review of the COD overall finances.

Observations and recommendations:

Financial reporting:

I received and reviewed the QuickBooks report of the Treasurer and the annual investment account statement from BNY for the year ended July 31, 2024. The QuickBooks report did not include the BNY investment balance and activity for the year. I have provided entries needed to record the activity. I included in my financial review the activity for the years ended July 31, 2024 through July 31, 2021 for comparative purposes. This reporting format provides a snapshot of financial trends and is a useful tool for leadership when considering whether short-term or long-term changes need to be made to revenue and expenses to minimize operational losses. The method of accounting for the Council is "cash basis." Thus, revenue is recognized when received. Expenses and assets acquired are recognized when payment is made. With regards to the July 31, 2023 and 2022 financial information, the transfer of the July quarterly distribution from the BNY investment account, in the amount of \$1,453 and \$895 respectively, was not deposited until the following month of August. In both years I increased the checking account balance to reflect undeposited funds to match the July disbursement in the BNY investment account. For the year ended July 31, 2024, the BNY July distribution was timely received and deposited.

• Trust investments:

The holdings are a selection of mutual funds. It is the practice of the COD to transfer the dividend and interest income quarterly to the COD bank accounts. There were no other transfers of funds from the BNY account to the COD bank accounts. During the year five holdings were liquidated and the proceeds invested in new and existing holdings. The value of the account holdings as of July 31, 2024, was \$292,447 as compared to the July 31, 2023, account value of \$262,212. Dividend and interest income from the investments were \$6,324. The portfolio realized a net gain of \$31,303 which consisted of reinvested capital gain distributions from mutual funds of \$779; realized losses from the sale of holdings in the amount of \$2,951, and net unrealized gains within the holdings in the amount of \$33,476. The unrealized gain represents the change in unrealized gains at the beginning of the year of \$15,349 and unrealized gains at the end of the year of \$48,825. Investment advisory fees of \$1,068 were charged against the account for the fiscal year.

Governmental compliance:

On September 4, 2024, I reviewed the IRS filing information for the COD reported on the IRS Tax-Exempt Organization search page; IRS Tax Exempt Organization Business Master File database postings as of August 8, 2024, and GuideStar. The COD electronically files Form 990-EZ and the most recent return filed was for the year-ended July 31, 2023. The return for the year-ended July 31, 2024, is not due until December 15, 2024, and the information to prepare the return has been provided to Comer & Company, CPA.

• Revenue enhancement and cost mitigation efforts: Revenue comes from three sources: per capita assessments, dinner receipts and investment income. The COD has been proactive in forecasting expenses and adjusting the per capita assessments, accordingly. The benefit of this forward-looking approach of matching needed revenue to expected expenses creates financial stability for the council as seen for fiscal years ended July 31, 2024, and 2023.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY

To the Commander-in-Chief, Active, Officers and Brothers assembled in Berlin, Connecticut for our One Hundred Forty Fifth session of this Connecticut Council of Deliberation on this, the twenty-seventh day of September, 2024:

The proceedings of the 144th session of this Council of Deliberation has been printed and posted to our websites for all our members to view, download or be referenced. The proceedings of today's 145th session of this Council of Deliberation will be created, printed and posted to our website for all our members to view, download or be referenced within the next few weeks.

All Actives, 33°'s, MSA's, current and past Heads of Bodies make up the permanent members of this Connecticut Council of Deliberation. This Connecticut Council of Deliberation currently has 238 Permanent Members.

Total membership within the Connecticut Valley's now stands at 1853 (a loss of 66). Taking a detailed look at the 1853 members we started this year with, we find:

- 41.6%, or 748 members, are 70 years old or older.
- 32%, or 592 members, are 59 years old or younger.

The breakdown of the State-wide membership is as follows: Collectively, we Initiated 62, Affiliated 4, Restored 12, Suspended 21, Discharged 41, and Demitted 9 members this past year. We have also reported a total of 73 Deaths. Together, this represents an overall loss of 66 members from the previous year.

The Valley of Bridgeport finished the year with a loss of 47. The Valley of New Haven finished the year with a gain of 1. The Valley of Waterbury finished the year with a loss of 5.

The Valley of Norwich finished the year with a loss of 10. The Valley of Hartford finished the year with a loss of 5.

The per capita tax of \$22,257.00 has been sent out; all Valleys have submitted their payments.

All underlying data used to create this report comes directly from Supreme Council's J365 Database (a graph of which will be provided in the CT COD Session Book).

Delegating responsibilities to other members of the valley such as a family life chairman helps build each member's participation and with a multitude of options for all types of service, provides opportunities for fellowship and building bonds.

This committee continues to recommend that each Valley in Connecticut utilize initiatives to strengthen its membership experience. These initiatives include: · Seven virtual Masonic Exhibits · Valley of Excellence Program · 32nd Degree Member Kits · The New Member Experience support materials · "Not just a man, a mason" promotional materials CONNECTICUT COUNCIL OF DELIBERATION 51 · Hauts Grades Academy Educational Program · Additional Leadership Materials · "You're Invited" Brochure · Online Petition, process, and payment · 4th Degree "Induction Ceremony" with Welcome package · A Northern Light magazine · PATHFINDER "Extend the journey to further light in Masonry" Through participating in various activities and exploring the resources of the Scottish Rite, to help each member become the best version of the man that they can

be. . Details regarding these programs can be found in the Northern Light magazine, the Supreme Council website (scottishritenmj.org), or can be presented by the chairman of this committee. We highly recommend that all valleys continue to promote these programs within its membership.

Ongoing Recommendations: The State Membership and Retention Committee continues to recognize that there are two primary concerns facing our committee that require our strict attention and focus; recruitment and retention. Successful recruitment and retention both necessitate that our Rite develop an environment that is simultaneously inspirational, convenient, and enjoyable for both potential members and existing members.

The committee would like to remind the brothers that light in Freemasonry is only transferred from brother to brother. It is important that all the members work to make everyone welcome at reunions. Upmost, it is imperative that you attend as many reunions as you can. Going the extra step to introduce yourself to a new or visiting brother will increase that brother's likelihood to return in the future. Verbally invite new members to family life events. Ask new brothers what they are looking for in the Scottish Rite and help direct them towards that masonic light they seek in the Scottish Rite.

The valleys of Connecticut have stepped up their efforts to present Rite on the Road opportunities, as well as the valleys of Hartford and Bridgeport continue to promote their degree teams to help the lodges with the BLUE wave. The committee feels that the increase of Mason/Non-Mason/Scottish Rite Nights like Scotch and Cigar Nights and other events have been effective in building Blue Lodge Membership and will in return increase the Scottish Rite Membership as well.

We must continue to adopt a multi-faceted approach that meets the needs of all our members as our communications needs to be in the form of several approaches to ensure that

we reach all our members. We must remember that the younger generations communicate differently, and they are our future.

We need to continue to produce and distribute high-quality traditional postal bulletins. Having a physical copy that lists the most important details of our valleys, its programs and calendar is immensely valuable. Many of our valleys produce high quality publications that supply our brethren with information, while at the same time can be used as a recruitment tool highlighting the benefits of the valley. We recommend that the distribution of these publications be opened beyond the members of our valleys and include all Grand Lodge and local lodge leadership. The extra cost of printing in the Connecticut Freemasons as a supplement is well worth it and has demonstrated our support for our Blue Lodges.

The valleys need to continue with consistent, timely, and frequent email notification programs. Some Valleys send out several a week and are having good open communications with the craft and increasing the participation at reunions and family life events.

The committee also encourages a social media presence for all valleys. These communication channels are having a large impact on the Blue Wave and are also successful in promoting our family life events.

The Valleys have done a better job working together to hold reunions, this has enhanced bounds between the valleys, and this appears to be welcoming to the craft. This effort has helped share the workload and increased brotherhood across the valleys. Conferring degrees with a large cast has inspired our new brethren and has appeared to energize our existing membership. As we continue to work together we hope to grow as a state. Continued efforts to work together will be a benefit to the COD and the Rite as a whole.

The committee would like to commend the efforts of our brethren across the state, who have tirelessly dedicated

themselves to make the Scottish Rite experience a fantastic journey towards further light in Masonry. The Supreme Council has made membership its primary focus. It has developed a wide range of programs, services, and initiatives to help support all Valleys. Children's Dyslexia Centers

The Children's Dyslexia Centers of Connecticut just completed its 22nd year of operations. Thanks to a very dedicated staff led by Center Directors Cheryl Sharkis, Connie Vogt and Paula Richardson, the Waterbury, Bridgeport, and Hartford Learning Centers have now changed the lives of over two hundred and eighty-five (285) children, of which one hundred thirty-three (133) have experienced the joy of "celebrating their achievement". They have also trained sixty-two (62) tutors, many who have gone on to provide tutoring services to hundreds of children within

and without of our network. None of this would be possible without the unwavering support the Centers receive from our members and all of our Connecticut Valleys.

This past year we tutored thirty- four (34) children but just as important, we are training six (6) new tutors, four (4) of whom plan on continuing as employees at our Bridgeport and Hartford locations. This will provide an opportunity to continue to increase our enrollment in 2024 and in future years.

The successful operation of these Learning Center locations would not be possible without our dedicated staff and tutors, the Board of Governors, and the extraordinary efforts of Cheryl, Connie and Paula.

I would like to express my deepest appreciation to all who have given of their time, talent, and treasure to make Connecticut's Dyslexia Centers so successful.

Scholarships

Upon receipt of fifty (50) applications for the Leon Abbott scholarships, Connecticut will award twelve (12) Abbott Scholarships, providing recognition of the academic achievement of our youth. Additionally, approximately seventy-five (75) Valley scholarships will also be awarded in varying amounts, to deserving students in recognition of their academic achievements. I would like to thank III. Brother Jack J.S. Farkas, 33°, MSA, Chairman and Brother Darrin Silhavy, 32°, Assistant Chairman of the Scholarship Committee and the remainder of the members of the Committee for their work this year.

Youth Groups

The Connecticut Council of Deliberation, Our Valleys and Members actively support our youth groups, DeMolay and Rainbow for Girls financially and with our time and talent and by participating in their events.

Deputy's Representatives

As our Active and Emeriti Members attend every Reunion and many Valley meetings and Family Life Programs, we do not presently have any appointed Deputy's Representatives. In lieu of having appointed Deputy's Representatives, we have a cadre of active 33° Brothers who fill the role of Deputy's Representatives by providing mentorship to the leaders of the Valleys and information to the Active and Emeriti Members.

Valleys

The Valleys of Connecticut continue to portray the Degrees of Scottish Rite Masonry in an exemplary manner, effectively demonstrating our core values to our candidates. I am pleased to report that every Valley in Connecticut achieved Valley of Excellence this year. This can be attributed to the engagement and leadership in each of our Valleys. To sustain this level of engagement and leadership, I have appointed III.: Brother Howard D. Turner, 33°, as the statewide coordinator for Degrees/Reunions. Supreme Council

At the Supreme Council Annual Session held in Lexington, Massachusetts, Brothers Steven M Allinson, Valley of New Haven, Frank Dlugoleski, of the Valley of Hartford, Harold A Elwell, of the Valley of Waterbury, Jason A. Fletcher, and Frank J. Saviano of the Valley of Norwich, Erik P Meyer of the Valley of Bridgeport, were elected to join Brothers Gary Shepard and Robert Polito, from the Valley of Bridgeport, Scott Bumps, from the Valley of New Haven, and John E. Stogden, from the Valley of Norwich to become Honorary Members of the Supreme Council. They all will receive the 33rd Degree in August 2025 in Indianapolis, Indiana.

Membership

Our membership continues to have ups and downs. We have seen a membership surge of new members joining the Connecticut Scottish Rite in some Valleys. We have had some success with the Ambassador Programs across the State. Don't hesitate to speak to newer Masons about expanding their Masonic knowledge by becoming involved with the Scottish Rite. The Valley of Hartford, New Haven and the Valley of Bridgeport have teams that are willing to travel to different Lodges or Blue Lodge Councils to give a brief education of the Scottish Rite and show some of the videos available online from Supreme. It offers the Master a program for the evening and has been very well received. It is essential that we find new ways of reaching out to prospective members through electronic means. Here in the present and into the future we find the young and the old constantly on their phones and connected to the internet in some way. We strive to keep our members informed by using tools like Constant Contact, websites, various social media outlets, multi-page pullouts in the CT Freemasons

publication and Brother to Brother calling programs. Most often we hear that our members are content with the way things are. That's unfortunate. We need active members to carry out our work. What can we do to inspire them? We have no control over the losses we sustain as our brothers pass to the Celestial Lodge Above, however we are optimistic for the future. But this past year we have starting to see an increase of membership due the success of the Connecticut Blue Lodge's Project Blue Wave. This program was enacted to increase membership in Connecticut's Blue Lodges and has brought the added opportunity to introducing more masons to the Scottish Rite.

The Valley of Hartford had an excellent year, adding 20 new members. At every reunion, brothers were encouraged to reach out to lodge brothers and others. New members also reached out to their friends, and the numbers continued to grow.

Our biggest challenge seems to be retention. We need to continue to find a way to bring value to our membership. In addition, we once again have the full support of our Grand Lodge. This harmonious relationship will make both organizations stronger.

Valley Activities

The Valleys of Connecticut have adopted a coordinated, revolving schedule of degrees. This program is designed to reduce the redundancy of degree portrayal in the state, coordinate casting resources for filling parts, and provide a more fulfilling experience for members to enjoy all the degrees of the Scottish Rite.

Valleys continue to hold a wide variety of events to satisfy the interest of every person. From support community events like 5k runs, charity walks and marching in parades to wine and beer tastings, fishing trips, boat cruises, baseball and soccer games, trips to see plays, concerts and museums, summer picnics, holiday parties, and cigar rolls. These events help keep members interested and engaged in the Valleys.

This past year all five Valleys in Connecticut attained the esteemed title from the Supreme Council as a Valley of Excellence. This program continues to provide a good template for our Valleys to use to improve on the items we are not doing so well. It consists of several areas where Valleys should put an emphasis, including Membership, Service and Philanthropy, Leadership Development and Operations. Some Valleys have restructured their committees to align with these areas to better suit their needs. By having some officers focus on areas like Membership engagement through Family Life, Service and Brotherhood events; Widows programs and Fundraising efforts; Leadership mentoring and development it strengthens the Valley in the process.

Children's Dyslexia Center

The Valleys all continue to support the three Connecticut Children's Dyslexia Centers with a multitude of events. The Valley of Hartford's 5K Road Race raised over \$20,000 for the CDC. The Valley of Bridgeport raised \$10,000 from the annual Turkey Trot and over \$13,000 from the Annual Christmas Party. The support and hard work are vital to the success of the center as is the continued support of individuals and corporations. It is one of the most rewarding investments one could make.

Conclusion

In conclusion, all the Valleys in the Connecticut Council of Deliberation continue to work hard. Always striving to make things better, to include our families, to participate in and reach out to our communities, and to embrace the brotherhood we are all a part of. All of the Valleys are back to work in our temples, meeting in person and presenting live degrees as well as those on DVD. We are back together in gatherings and other family/brotherly events. We have the support of our Deputy, our Actives, our Active Emeriti, the Supreme Council and the Grand Lodge. We also have the skills, talent and dedication of our hard- working Brothers to

accomplish it. Let us enjoy our successes, but never fail to live up to the challenges of our failures.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON STRATEGIC PLANNING

To the Illustrious Commander-in-chief, officers, and Brethren of the Connecticut Council of Deliberation in session in Berlin, Connecticut on September 27, 2024. The Committee continues to address issues of membership retention, the continuing cooperation between the Valleys, and the family life events offered.

Membership:

We continue to remind our membership that each of us are ambassadors for the Scottish Rite. We need to keep our lodges informed of our activities by mentioning them at meetings. We should speak to newer Masons about expanding their Masonic knowledge by becoming involved with the Scottish Rite. We should inform them about The Path Forward, and direct them to the Not just a man. A Mason website. As always, our biggest challenge is retention. Valley officers and leaders should reach out to current members on a regular basis. There are many media tools like constant contact, websites, social media outlets, virtual meeting programs, the Connecticut Freemasons publication, brother to brother calling programs, and the Valley newsletters which may be put to use. As always, these information highways need to be consistent and

content updated frequently, lest we lose the interest of those we are trying to keep and attract.

The Valley of Norwich, which held 6 reunions and performed 12 live degrees, along with assisting other Valleys 5 times. Continuing to attract and retain members through multiple reunions. These reunions are great opportunities for Valley membership involvement and fellowship. Another opportunity for Valley involvement is the North Stonington fair, clam fritter, and chowder Booth. This event continues to bring members of the valley together to help raise money for the Children's Dyslexia Center of Connecticut and shows the public the good work the fraternity does for the community.

The Valley of Hartford has done a better job of scheduling activities for all 12 months of the year. The heads of the bodies are responsible for specific months. In addition to scheduling their degrees, they also plan other events in those months, including their summer months. The events can be family trips, movies, making phone calls to brothers, blood drives, game nights, etc. These events promote engagement among the brothers. A family life coordinator was appointed. It is still the responsibility of the heads of the bodies to come up with family life ideas. The family life coordinator is the point person to keep track of everything and report to the Executive Council. The Valley of Bridgeport held 11 reunions over the last year with at least one live degree for every live meeting with numerous video options. In addition, the valley of Waterbury held five reunions and presented 7 degrees. The valley of New Haven also presented three reunions and 4 degrees. The Valley of Norwich held a food drive in December. Along with the Outreach Program meal packing event, along with 2 ice cream socials. Also 4 family life events with other Valleys to help assist in membership retention. The Valley is grateful to the Valley Of Hartford for involving the Valley Of Norwich and their many family life events. The Valley of Bridgeport held, 13 family life events, Valley of New Haven held 2 family life events, and the Valley of Waterbury held 4 family life events.

Some of these events included corn hole tournament, family game night, St. Patrick's Day dinner, St. Patrick's Day parade, summer, picnics, Octoberfest, scotch and cigar nights, fishing trips, trip to Lexington and a Boston Red Sox game, dinner, and show at the Goodspeed opera house, Bridgeport Youth Symphony, installation dinner, and Christmas party. The Valley of New Haven held last year's council of the liberation and the Valley of Waterbury holding this year's session. Valley of Hartford's membership has dropped from 1400 to 600 over the past eight years. The valley has a very high percentage of senior brothers (>80 years old) compared to other valleys. The Valley has been doing a great job of retaining brothers, but need to step up recruitment. The valley of Bridgeport saw a gain of six members with a total of 517 members with 24 additions. three restorations, 44 deaths and no NPD's. The heads of the bodies need to do more to engage with new members and get them involved. Degree directors should ask new members to take part of the degrees. Once these members become involved, they will talk to their lodge brothers about Scottish Rite. We will also have trained brothers visit lodges and make presentations. The Valley of Norwich, assisted in holding a joint consistory day in the spring with the other consistories in the state. This continues to strengthen relations and cooperation within the state. The Valley of Bridgeport assisted with a Consistory Day and looks forward to participating again next year. There should be more engagement among the Valleys. Degree teams can visit other Valleys to portray a degree, or joint degrees can be arranged. Also, when a Valley plans in activity, other Valley's should be invited to participate. In April 2023, the Valley of Hartford worked with Valley of Bridgeport and Valley of Norwich to portray both the 24th and 32nd°.

Children's dyslexia center:

The Valley's continue to support the Children's Dyslexia Center. However, the pandemic continued to impact the events. In Waterbury, the walk, saw lower participation. The

Hartford 5K returned this year as well as the Thanksgiving Day Turkey Trot in Stratford, but with smaller numbers. The Valley of Norwich was able to hold the clam chowder and fritter booth at the North Stonington fair again this year, enabling the Valley to continue with support of the Dyslexia Center. Valley Of Bridgeport for the second year a virtual walk on Valentine's Day that was successful, but not as successful as the previous year. The valley of Bridgeport also held its annual turkey trot and the Valley of Waterbury, also held their annual walk as well. The continued support of individuals and cooperation is vital to the success of the Waterbury campus and our satellite operations.

Conclusion:

In conclusion, all the Valleys that form the Council of the Deliberation should continue to focus Scottish Rite in Connecticut as a whole. They should continue to be more engagement among the Valleys. We should continue to push degree teams to visit other valleys to portray a degree or encourage joint degrees. We encourage Valleys to invite the other Valleys to family life activities. Our brethren desire and need communication, not only from their own Valley, but from all the Valleys to support them. Enhanced communication across the Valleys continue to strengthen Scottish Rite in Connecticut, and offer more opportunities to our members.

REPORT OF THE SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE

To the Illustrious Commander-in-Chief, Officers and Brethren of the Connecticut Council of Deliberation, meeting on September 27, 2024, the 145th COD session, meeting, Shelton, CT:

This year, The Supreme Council, located in Lexington, Massachusetts has awarded \$13,200.00 to Connecticut for Abbott Scholarships. Connecticut C.O.D. awarded 13 \$1,000 and 1 \$200 awards with Valley of Bridgeport adding \$800 for a total of fourteen Abbott Scholarships. This represents an increase of two more Abbott Scholarships for Connecticut. The State Scholarship Committee of the Connecticut Council of Deliberation has recommended 14 applicants to become the 2024 Abbott Scholarship recipients. Following tradition, these recommendations were made to Illustrious Kevin Hecht, 33°, Deputy of Connecticut and to the Supreme Council.

Named for Leon M. Abbott, Sovereign Grand Commander from 1921 to 1932, the Scholarship Program provides financial support for the continuing education of young men and women from Scottish Rite families and Masonic-related youth groups. Since 1951, more than \$4 million has been awarded to students from each state of the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction.

Eligibility:

Those meeting any of the following criteria are eligible to apply for the 2024 Abbott Scholarship program:

- A Scottish Rite Mason of the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction.
- A student directly related (by bloodline or by legal means) to a Scottish Rite Mason in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction, or a member of a youth organization sponsored by the Masonic fraternity in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction who is:
- A high school senior, currently accepted at an accredited trade school, who has attained a minimum grade point average of 2.75 on a 4.0 scale.
- A high school senior, or undergraduate, or graduate student currently enrolled at an accredited college or university.

• A member of DeMolay, Rainbow or Jobs Daughters in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction, or a student from the Dyslexia Learning Center who is a high school senior or is currently enrolled at an accredited college or university, who has attained a minimum grade point average of 2.75 on a 4.0 scale.

The State Scholarship Committee received a total of 68 applications for the Abbott and Valley Scholarships from five Valleys in Connecticut. The 14 recipients of this year's Abbott Scholarships, and all recipients of the Valley Scholarships demonstrated excellence and genuine financial need. Impressive letters of recommendations from teachers, professors and academic counselors supported all applications. Recipients also exhibited extensive volunteer community service, broad extracurricular activities, leadership and honors/awards in sports, music and drama. Many are holding part-time jobs during the school calendar year and full-time summer employment to help pay for their college costs.

The following is this year's results of the Abbott Scholarship awards for Connecticut.

From the Supreme Council Blue envelope appeal, Connecticut received back from the Supreme Council a total of \$13,200.00 for Abbott Scholarships. We end this year better than the past few years with 13 \$1000.00 Scholarships and one \$200 Abbott Scholarships for a total of 14 Scholarships. That is an increase of two awards for 2024. The total of Abbott Scholarships and Valley Scholarships received this year was 68 for the state. We got a number from the DeMolay, Rainbow, and one was from the Learning Centers.

Waterbury Abbott Scholarships Awarded 2 Dylan Albansese Nicholas Bates No Valley Scholarships Awarded

Norwich Abbott Scholarships Awarded 2 Lillian Turner Audrey-Jane Turner And 3 Valley Scholarships Awarded

Hartford Abbott Scholarships Awarded 3 William Perry Lisa Flynn Vivienne Grube And 13 Valley Scholarships Awarded

New Haven Abbott Scholarships Awarded 3 Taylor Batterton Adam Glassman Alexandra Brenton And 15 Valley Scholarships Awarded

Bridgeport Abbott Scholarships Awarded 4 Justin Bridges Aidan Papp Sebastian Pesquera

The above 13 all received a \$1000.00 Abbott Award Jeffrey Holton received the \$200.00 award and Bridgeport added \$800.00 more to make another Abbott Award. And 23 Valley Scholarships Awarded. That makes for 14 Abbott Scholarships being awarded for the State of Connecticut.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR

Children's Dyslexia Centers of Connecticut, A Scottish Rite Charity

To the Illustrious Commander in Chief, Officers, and Brethren of the Council of Deliberations, in Annual Session in Berlin, Connecticut On September 27th, 2024:

Good morning and greetings from all of us at the Children's Dyslexia Centers of Connecticut. I am Cheryl Sharkis, the Director, Trainer, and Tutor at the Waterbury Center.

We are proud to report to you that the Children's Dyslexia Center continues to develop and progress forward. We have celebrated the achievements of more than 133 youngsters. Upon completion of their work at the Center, all have progressed at least 2 to 3 grade levels in their reading skills, with many surpassing this average. The most current ceremony was June 7th, with five youngsters completing their work at the Centers: 1 from Bridgeport and four from

Waterbury. At present, we have experienced 21 Celebration of Achievement Ceremonies. Alumni continue to stop by periodically to share their achievements and upcoming plans. We are thrilled and moved that they are willing to take time out of their busy schedules and remember their Tutors. There is no feeling better than knowing that you have made a positive difference in a person's life!

The Centers' Staff includes 1 Director and 2 Co-Directors, 10 Practitioners, and 5 Tutors studying for practitioner 2 certification. The Center's Scholar Training program has certified more than 50 Tutors. Our current Scholar training cycle began September 21st with 5 Scholars, 2 in Bridgeport, 2 in Hartford, and 1 in Waterbury. The Centers are currently providing tutorial sessions to 8 youngsters in the Hartford Area (+4 in Oct.), 9 in Bridgeport (+4 in Oct.), and 17 in Waterbury (+2 in Oct.).

Once again, we have finalized each youngster's annual progress assessment. We are thrilled to report that everyone is progressing and developing, with the gap between their grade and performance levels reducing significantly. There are approximately 28 youngsters remaining on the waitlist. If you know of a child who may benefit from participating in the Children's Dyslexia Center Program, please encourage their families to contact the Center.

Our Office Business Manager, Mr. Dan, has been very successful in corresponding with families, prospective trainees, and headquarters electronically. He has mastered completing and submitting payroll and credit card allocation forms. Mr. Dan was extremely helpful in dealing with Eversource and ADT. We are grateful for his growing contributions.

We are all very proud to be participating in such a positive and empowering youth program. Enabling these youngsters to better achieve their academic potential is magnificently

rewarding and uplifting for all involved. Individual generosity, the annual RUN, Dyslexia Awareness WALK, the Holiday Celebration, the Turkey Trot, the Stonington Fair, and all the continued support from the supporting Masonic bodies perpetuate the rewards.

Thanks to the Scottish Rite philanthropic endeavors, you are enabling these youngsters to live as Shakira's "Try Everything" lyrics invoke, I won't give up, no, I won't give in....Till I reach the end and I will start again....

Lessons from the Past: The Historians Report

As I reflect on the last year, it becomes increasingly relevant that we study and preserve our history. At a time when some view history as flexible to serve the whims of a few, we need to make sure we do not forget where we come from and to do this we must make the effort to research and study the lineage from whence we came.

In Scottish Rite, we have a rich and varied history including the lineage of our degrees. Although our degrees have changed over time and have been in a process of evaluation and change to move with the times to reflect our core values, we should not disregard the style and symbols of the older degrees. They can often add to our current degrees and where a degree has been replaced, the former degree can still shed light on our studies in this University of Freemasonry.

In our rituals, there is published at the beginning of the book a history of the degree. This can be a valuable guide to the history of the degrees, their influences, and how they have changed over time. An example of this is the 20th degree we now know as the George Washington degree. Previously, the main character of the degree was Frederick King of Prussia. In the years following World War I, it was decided that having a Prussian as the hero of the degree was not ideal, as such they changed the setting of the degree to an American degree where George Washington is the hero, as it were, and teaches the same type of message.

As degrees have been focused on the core values, some of the introductions have been removed. But these still have value for their esoteric and philosophical value. For example, in the 1992 edition of the 8th degree, Intendant of

the Building, are found these interesting lessons: "Illustrious King David, I have made the five steps of exactitude; I have penetrated to the innermost parts of the Temple, and have seen the great light, in which is the mysterious character Yod, Yod, Yod" (The apron being "triangular in shape, white, lined with crimson, and bordered with green. On the area is depicted a five pointed star, with a Hebrew Yod thrice repeated in the center, and over that a balance; on the flap a triangle with one of the following letters (in Hebrew) in each angle, the initials of the words Ben Khurim, Achar, and Jackinah.

It is noted that an Intendant of the Building "be skilled as an architect, and learned in the knowledge of the East and Egypt. But it is equally necessary that you should be benevolent and charitable... Recognizing all men as your brethren. "In the 15th degree, Knight of the East, or Sword, one of the older obligations says "I further obligate myself to adore the Lord God of Hosts; to assist the distressed; to be kind to worthy strangers; to shun the vicious; to observe the laws of my country; to aid in burying the dead, and to protect the innocent". The jewel of the degree is also interesting "[it] shall consist of three triangles, one within the other, diminishing in size, and enclosing two naked swords, cross hilted, pointed up, resting on the base of the inner triangle. This symbolizes the triumph of Freemasonry over Bigotry, Ignorance and Intolerance.

For degrees that are no longer part of our canon, they can still be of great interest and value, and can be studied as allowed by the Supreme Council. One example is the old 12th degree of Grand Master Architect (1976 edition). The degree involves a school of architecture where the lesson of the degree, the search for Wisdom and Knowledge are discussed. I found it fascinating with its discussion of various architectural and drafting tools and their symbolism. This became interesting with an exhibit at the Yale Center for British Art "Compass & Rule; Architecture as Mathematical

Practice in England 1500-1750". In the exhibit book (2009), the photo accompanying the Part I title is a folding rule inscribed: "1655 Robert Trollap of Yorke free Mason". The exhibit dovetailed nicely into the 12th degree as both look at the working tools of an architect. In the degree, the Master of Ceremonies presents the candidate with the tools of a Grand Master Architect, compasses, parallel ruler, protractor, plain scale, the sector, and slide rule. Part of the lecture on the slide rule says: "It is one of the greatest inventions of the mind of man, comparable to the discovery of the wheel and lever, all alike invaluable to the architect and builder, and without which the greatest structures of all time, from the pyramids standing upon the shifting sands of the desert to the newest and most modern structures, would never have been built. Just as the slide ruler so; ves the complex problems of mathematics, let us strive to grasp and solve the complex problems presented by the Universe in which we live and which are involved in our very existence, to know and understand the sublime truths contained in our Masonic Philosophy; and to communicate freely of our knowledge to others, that they may share with us the blessings of Wisdom." How many of us remember slide rules, or even still have one (needless to say, I collected a few!)? But the lessons in this degree, for example, are definitely worth an education night at your Valley.

So when you clean and sort out your closets, keep an eye out for old rituals, they will make a great addition to your libraries and education nights. You can also check out the books available from our Supreme Council, including "The 1783 Francken Manuscript" (Supreme Council, 2017) and see one of the founding documents of our rituals.

Since we identify ourselves as the University of Freemasonry, we need to preserve and study our history and our rituals in all their forms, so we can truly communicate our Masonic Truth to the world and uphold the ideals of our forebears; and yes you might have to read, study, and digest

and test yourself so you can bring Wisdom to yourself and your brethren.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

FOR THE CONNECTICUT COUNCIL OF DELIBERATION ANCIENT ACCEPTED SCOTTISH RITE OF FREEMASONRY

ARTICLE I

Title and Allegiance

Sec. 1 This Council shall be known as "Connecticut Council of Deliberation of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry."

Sec. 2 It is formed under and hereby acknowledges and yields allegiance to the Supreme Council of Sovereign Grand Inspectors General of the Thirty-third and last degree of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry for the Northern Jurisdiction of the United States of America, having its Grand East in the city of Lexington, Massachusetts.

ARTICLE II

Meetings, Notices, Quorum

Sec. 1 The Connecticut Council of Deliberation shall meet annually. The time and place of each Annual Meeting shall be determined by the Council, provided, however, that such time and place of meeting may be changed by the Deputy for any reason deemed by him to require such action.

Sec. 2 A special meeting of the Council may be called by the Deputy for such time and place within this state as he shall determine, or by this council at any annual meeting.

Sec. 3 Written or printed notice of each annual or special meeting of this Council shall be given by the Secretary, to be served either personally, by mail, or by electronic media to each member at least ten (10) days before said meeting. Such notice shall state the purpose thereof.

Sec. 4 Accredited representatives of a majority of the Scottish Rite Bodies in this state shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE III

Members, Officers

Sec. 1 The members of this Council of Deliberation shall be such as are prescribed by the Supreme Council.

Sec. 2a The Council shall elect the following officers at each annual meeting to hold office for one year or until their successors shall be elected and installed:

First Lieutenant Commander

Second Lieutenant Commander

Minister of State

Chancellor

Prior

Treasurer

Secretary

Hospitaler

Master of Ceremonies

Seneschal

Standard bearer

Guard

Sentinel

Sec. 2b The Commander-in-Chief shall appoint a member of this Council of Deliberation as Grand historian who shall keep a record of all events of historical significance and report thereon to this Council annually.

Sec. 3 In case of vacancy in any office, by death, removal from the jurisdiction or otherwise, or failure to elect officers in this Council, the Illustrious Commander-in-Chief may make appointments to be in force until the next annual meeting.

Sec. 4 Each officer of this Council shall perform the duties customarily incident to his office in accordance with Masonic usage and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to him by resolution of this Council or by the Illustrious Commander-in-Chief.

Sec. 5 The officers shall be installed at the annual meeting or as soon thereafter as practicable.

Sec. 6 Scottish Rite Bodies in this State may elect members of the Rite in good standing in the Northern jurisdiction as Honorary Members under such rules and regulations as their By-Laws may prescribe; provided, however, that no member of a Valley may be elected an Honorary member of the Valley in which he is a member.

Sec. 7 Semi-public installation of the officers of Scottish Rite Bodies in this State is permitted.

Sec. 8 A personal contact shall be made with each resident Connecticut member of the Scottish Rite before he can be suspended or dropped from membership for non-payment of dues and assessments. The Trice Potent Master of each Valley shall be responsible for the personal contact in his Valley. The Secretary shall retain the report for future reference and the records.

Sec. 9a This Council of Deliberation authorizes the holding of dual memberships for members of the Scottish Rite in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction.

Sec. 9b A member of the Rite holding membership in a Valley outside of this State may apply for dual membership in a Valley in this State provided dual membership is permitted in the State of his membership, or a waiver of jurisdiction is obtained.

Sec. 9c A dual member shall be required to pay the customary dues of the Bodies which he joins, but no fee becoming a dual member shall be charged.

ARTICLE IV

Standing Committees

Sec. 1 At the close of each annual meeting, the Illustrious Commander-in-Chief, or in his absence the presiding officer, shall appoint the following Standing Committees to continue in office until a new committee be appointed:

Committee on Business

Committee on Credentials

Committee on Dispensations and Charters

Committee on Finance

Committee on Meritorious Service Award

Committee on Necrology

Committee on Next Place of Meeting

Committee on Nominations

Committee on Rules and Regulations

Committee on State of the Rite

Committee on Insurance

- **Sec. 2** The Committee on Business shall review the address of the Illustrious Commander-in-Chief and shall make recommendations regarding the appointment and disposition of the several parts of the address.
- **Sec. 3** The Committee on Credentials shall pass on the qualifications of every person presenting himself for attendance at each annual or special meeting of this Council and to report thereon at such meeting.
- **Sec. 4** The Committee on Dispensations and Charters shall investigate every application for a dispensation or charter and make a written recommendation thereon to this Council.
- **Sec. 5** The Committee on Finance shall audit the books and accounts of the Secretary, Treasurer, and Hospitaler and make a written report thereon at the annual meeting of this Council. It shall prepare and present a budget of estimated receipts and expenditures for the ensuing year.
- **Sec. 6** The Committee on Meritorious Service Award shall consist of the Presiding Officers of the Bodies of the Rite in the State, who shall present recommendations in writing through the Chairman of the Committee, to the Commander-in-Chief prior to each Council of Deliberation annual meeting.

- **Sec. 7** The Committee on Necrology shall report at each meeting of this Council the names, degrees, titles, and date of death, of all members of the Supreme Council in this State dying during the preceding year, together with similar data on such other outstanding Masonic leaders as it may deem proper.
- **Sec. 8** The Committee on Next Place of Meeting shall recommend at each annual meeting of this Council a place for subsequent annual meeting or meetings of this Council.
- **Sec. 9** The Committee on Nominations shall consist of the members of the Supreme Council accredited to this State. It shall be the duty of such Committee to nominate candidates for election to the offices of this Council at each meeting place.
- **Sec. 10** The Committee on Rules and Regulations shall consider all matters pertaining to the laws, rules, regulations, and jurisprudence referred to it by the Deputy or by this Council and shall make recommendations thereon.
- **Sec. 11** The Committee on State of the Rite shall consider throughout the year all matters pertaining to the State of the Rite in this State, make recommendations to the Deputy from time to time, and it shall make a written report to this Council at each annual meeting.
- **Sec. 12** The Committee on Insurance shall consist of three members who shall administer all insurance and related matters pertaining to the Scottish Rite Bodies in the State of Connecticut.

ARTICLE V

Finances

- **Sec. 1** The Secretary of each Body of the Rite in this State shall, annually, at least 7 days prior to the annual meeting, forward to the Secretary of the Council of Deliberation a remittance of the per capita tax of not more than five dollars (\$5.00) (as amended 8/15/2007; and on 9/14/2019) per each member on its roll of membership as of June 15.
- **Sec. 2** This Council at any annual or special meeting may vote assessments on the Bodies of the Rite in this State as this Council shall deem proper, provided, however, that every such additional assessment shall be designated for some particular purpose and shall be used only for that purpose.
- **Sec. 3** The fiscal year of this Council shall begin on the first day of August in each year and shall end on the 31st day of July in the next succeeding year.
- **Sec. 4** No money shall be drawn on the Treasurer except upon a warrant signed by the Secretary, countersigned by the Illustrious Commander-in-Chief, and issued in payment of an appropriation or in accordance with an order previously made by this Council.
- **Sec. 5** The Secretary, Treasurer, and Hospitaler of this Council of Deliberation shall be bonded in such manner and in such amount as shall be determined by resolution of the Council, or in default of such determination then determined by the Deputy, the premium on such bonds to be paid by this Council.

ARTICLE VI

Jurisdiction of Valleys

Sec. 1 Each Valley in this State shall have concurrent jurisdiction within the State of Connecticut.

ARTICLE VII

Meritorious Service Award

- **Sec. 1a** An award be known as the "Arthur M. Brown, 33°, Meritorious Service Award" is hereby renamed for the State of Connecticut to be known as the "Frederick H. Lorenson, 33°, Meritorious Service Award". It shall be conferred upon Scottish Rite Masons who, by reason of meritorious services of a masonic character, are worthy and should be so cited.
- **Sec. 1b** The award shall consist of a jewel in memory of the late Deputy for this State, Ill. Frederick H. Lorenson, 33°.
- **Sec. 1c** The recipients must have received the grade of Sublime Prince of the Royal Secret.
- **Sec. 1d** The Awards presented in any State in any one year shall not exceed a maximum of two recipients from each Valley, but not cumulative, provided that an additional special allocation for any Valley may be made by the Deputy for the State. [ART. 905(d) 2013]
- **Sec. 2a** The following procedure shall be followed by this Council relative to selecting those who are to receive such awards and in presenting the awards to those selected.
- **Sec. 2b** The presiding officers of the Bodies of the Rite in the State shall present recommendations in writing to the Council of Deliberation, nominating the member or members of their Bodies whom they feel should receive the award. No presiding officer is eligible to receive this award while he is involved in the nominating process.
- **Sec. 2c** Such nominations shall be referred to the Standing Committee on Meritorious Service Award at least one month prior to the annual meeting of this Council, except that by unanimous consent of this Council nominations may be referred to the Committee at the annual meeting for consideration at that annual meeting.
- **Sec. 2d** The Committee on Meritorious Service Award shall consider the nominations referred to it from the various Valleys and shall make recommendations to the Deputy, at each annual meeting thereof, of members of the Rite in this State to receive the Meritorious Service Award.
- **Sec. 3** The presentation of the award and insignia shall be made by the Deputy, or someone selected by him. Such presentation shall be made either in the Valley in which the recipient is a member or at the meeting of the Council of Deliberation, as the Deputy may determine.

Sec. 4 The jewel shall consist of an ornamented gold bar, one and a half inches long, with the words "Connecticut Council of Deliberation" in gold letters set in red enamel. A second gold bar, one and a quarter inches long, is suspended from the first bar by 5 gold links. On this bar shall be the words "Frederick H. Lorenson, 33°, Meritorious Service Award" in gold letters set in red enamel. A double headed eagle, emblem of the Thirty-Second Degree, is suspended from this second bar by three gold links. The figures "32" are of gold set in a triangle of black enamel. The height of the jewel shall be two and three-quarters inches.

ARTICLE VIII

Amendments

Sec. 1 By Amendment of the Supreme Council Constitutions, etc. Upon amendment of the constitutions and regulations of the Supreme Council of Sovereign Grand Inspectors General of the Thirty-third and last degree of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry for the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction of the United States of America, or upon the promulgation or any decree of said Supreme Council, inconsistent with any provision of these Rules and Regulations, then in every such event, and without any further act or deed whatsoever, these Rules and Regulations shall be deemed to be and shall be automatically amended in conformity therewith.

Sec. 2 By Council of Deliberation, these Rules and Regulations may be amended at any annual meeting of this Council by a majority vote of the members present, provided the proposed amendment or amendments have been presented at the preceding annual meeting, and due notice thereof shall have been given to the members and provided, further, that an amendment or amendments may be adopted at the annual meeting at which it is presented, by a two-thirds vote of the members present, thirty (30) days' notice of the proposed amendment or amendments having been given to the members.

Sec. 3 All By-Laws, Rules and Regulations previously adopted by this Council are hereby rescinded.
